

DUAL ENROLLMENT AGREEMENT
BETWEEN
FAYETTEVILLE TECHNICAL COMMUNITY COLLEGE
AND
FAYETTEVILLE STATE UNIVERSITY

- I. This agreement is designed to provide all articulation students who commit to pursuing an associate's degree program in criminal justice at Fayetteville Technical Community College to receive a letter of admission to Fayetteville State University. This letter will state that the student has been admitted to Fayetteville State University, contingent upon the student's successful completion of all required developmental courses and at least six hours of transferable credits in each of the following subject areas: English, mathematics, natural sciences, social and behavioral sciences, and foreign languages. Students will be asked to indicate their intention to pursue the dual enrollment plan. Students who accept the offer of admission to Fayetteville State University will be considered "dual enrolled" students.
- II. Students will receive a degree plan that will specify the courses required at each institution, with equivalent courses noted, to earn an associate's degree at Fayetteville Technical Community College and a baccalaureate degree at Fayetteville State University in Criminal Justice. Students will be able to enroll in courses at both institutions simultaneously and will have an advisor at each institution.
- III. Students will not be required to pay an application fee at Fayetteville State University, but to activate their enrollment at Fayetteville State University, they will need to complete the Dual Enrollment Form, obtain appropriate signatures from Fayetteville Technical Community College officials, and submit it to the Fayetteville State University Office of Admissions prior to their first semester of enrollment. So long as a dual enrolled student enrolls in at least one course at Fayetteville State University or Fayetteville Technical Community College, he or she will be eligible to re-enroll in subsequent semesters. (A student who does not maintain continuous enrollment at Fayetteville State University or Fayetteville Technical Community College will need to re-submit the Dual Enrollment Form.) Students enrolled at both institutions simultaneously may not exceed the course load limits in any single semester as agreed upon by both institutions.
- IV. Students maintaining the status as a "dual enrolled student" must be enrolled in at least one of the institutions each semester (excluding summer terms); students who are not continuously enrolled for one or more semesters at either institution lose the designation of "dual enrolled student," and must apply for readmission to both of the institutions. An applicant's previous designation of dual enrolled student does not guarantee acceptance to the institution or re-acquisition of the dual enrollment designation. Students are required to meet the academic progression standards of both institutions. Students placed on academic

suspension at either institution will lose their dual-enrollment status. Students may appeal academic suspension according to the guidelines of the appropriate institution, but approval for re-enrollment of a previously suspended student at one institution does *NOT* restore the student to dual enrollment status or re-enrollment at the other institution.

- V. Students will be responsible for fulfilling financial obligations of both institutions, including tuition and all required fees. Students receiving financial aid may not receive financial aid from both institutions simultaneously. For financial aid purposes, Fayetteville Technical Community College will be considered the home institution for dual enrolled students until they earn a total of sixty credits. Fayetteville State University will be considered the home institution for students after they have earned sixty or more hours. Students who are enrolled simultaneously at Fayetteville Technical Community College and Fayetteville State University will authorize the home institution to use financial aid awards to pay tuition and fees to the other ("host") institution.
- VI. Qualified faculty members will teach all courses accepted for transfer to Fayetteville State University. Faculty teaching courses for transfer must meet the standards set forth in Criteria for Accreditation, section 4.8.2.2 by the Southern Association for Colleges and Schools.
- VII. The dual enrollment articulation agreement in Criminal Justice between Fayetteville State University and Fayetteville Technical Community College will be effective as of April 15, 2005.







Academic Regulations: In making this request, the student understands that he or she is subject to the academic regulations governing registration deadlines, grades, course withdrawals, course repeats, and other related items of both institutions.

2. Courses earned at the host institution will not affect the GPA of the student at the home institution.

Bill Payment: In making this request, the student agrees to fulfill the financial obligations associated with enrolling in courses at both institutions, including all required fees. The student will receive a bill from each institution and will be subject to the regulations of each institution regarding payment deadlines, refunds for dropping or withdrawing from courses.

The student should check the box below if he or she plans to use financial aid to cover the costs of enrollment at either institution.

Financial Aid In making this request, the student understands that he or she can receive financial aid at the home institution only. He or she must complete the FAFSA and submit by appropriate deadlines all required supporting documents to the Financial Aid Office of the home institution. The student authorizes the following:

1. The host institution will send a bill to the home institution for the cost of enrollment at the host institution.
2. The home institution will make payment to the host institution in the amount of the bill from the host institution, and the home institution will make payment to the host institution prior to issuing a financial aid refund to the student.
3. The Host Institution agrees to notify Home Institution of any changes in this student's enrollment status. In the event the student drops course(s) or ceases to be enrolled, each institution will apply its own refund policy. If a refund is due to the Title IV program at the host institution, the "host" institution shall pay the refund promptly to the home institution. Calculation of any necessary repayment of a cash disbursement will be performed by the "home" institution.
